LLOYD HIGA LEADS HUI MAKAAALA THROUGH 1998

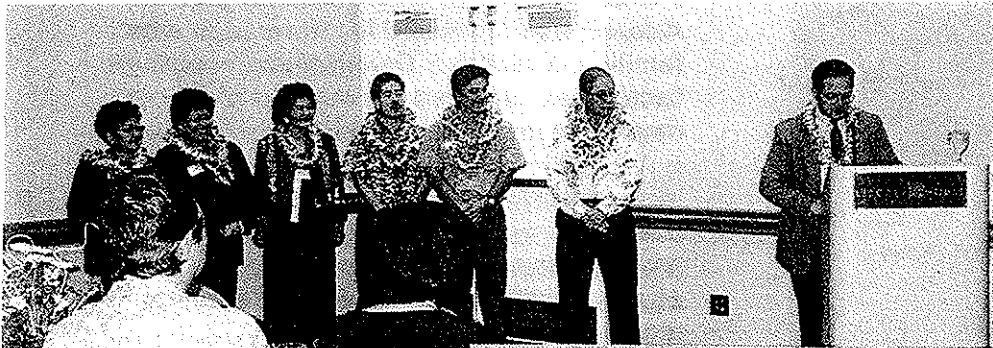

Hui Makaala is proud of the President of the Hawaii United Okinawa Association (HUOA) for 1998, PAM TAMASHIRO. Pam hails as the President of Hui Makaala in 1990--the 90th anniversary of Okinawan immigration to Hawaii. Her theme is "YUIMARU: Defining the Uchinanchu Spirit--Past, Present, Future."

Pamela Emiko Tamashiro was born in Honolulu on August 11, 1954, and grew up in Kalihi. She graduated from St. Andrew's Priory in 1972 and went on to study sociology at the University of Hawaii. She earned a bachelor's degree in sociology while at UH Manoa in 1976. From 1977 to 1988, Tamashiro worked as administrative assistant to the chief counsel of the U.S. Senate Subcommittee on Merchant Marine and Tourism, chaired by Senator Daniel K. Inouye. In 1980, she left Washington to enroll in Lewis and Clark College's Northwestern School of Law in Portland, Oregon. She received a juris doctorate degree from Lewis and Clark College in 1983 and passed the Hawaii State Bar in October 1983 on her first try.

Tamashiro met her now husband, Family Court Judge John Bryant, Jr., at Lewis and Clark College. They have two children: Reiko, 14, and Chiemi, 6.

Tamashiro was with the law firm of Kidani, Oshima and Wong; as a deputy prosecuting attorney under Charles Marsland; as deputy Corporation Counsel under Mayor Frank F. Fasi; as a partner in the law firm of Chun Chipchase Takayama Tamashiro; and then in January, 1996, she opened her own independent practice, specializing in family law, criminal law, business law and litigation.

Pam estimates that she spends 10 to 15 hours per week on HUOA affairs and anticipates putting in even more time as president. Pam says, "I think I'm doing this because I like the people in the Okinawan community. They have supported me

through good times and hard times, so I would like to support them and the community by making some positive changes, as well as continuing those programs that have been successful in the Okinawan community. I really feel that this is a great honor. I view this as an awesome responsibility."

In 1978, the first year that Akira Sakima's involvement as a volunteer could be counted toward recognition as a senior volunteer, this is the list of organizations to which he gave his time. Hui Makaala, an Okinawan social/service club, Kokua Kalihi Valley, a family service center, the Kalihi YMCA, the Kalihi Palama Community Council, the Susannah Wesley Community Center, the Hawaii Community Association for the Deaf, the United Okinawa Association and the Kalihi Palama Business Association. During that watershed year, he found time to be elected to the State Constitutional Convention as a delegate.

Among the various forms of service to these organizations, he has been called to be a board member, president and to chair many activities.

Through the years, his involvement with community organizations experienced its changes. He moved from some of the organizations named to leadership positions with the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints, the Hawaii Okinawa Center, the Okinawan Ancestral Village Club, the Moiliili Business Association, the Moanalua Senior Citizen's Club, the Dole Intermediate School Council and to election on the State Board of Education.

Akira reserves time for stretching, swimming and walking exercises. As a lay minister, he visits members of his Kalihi Church. He takes Okinawan samisen lessons and has been very active in education. He volunteers his home to host exchange students from Okinawa, to give them a view of education, social activity and tourism in Hawaii. He is called to lecture at the University of Hawaii, and serves as an instructor for his church's school.

His nomination statement credits his leadership qualities to his upbringing on the island of Hawaii. His accomplishments reflect a lifetime of personal and professional commitment to the State of Hawaii. His boundless enthusiasm and energy comes from the inspiration of the Uchinanchu spirit of a "Heart That Never Gets Tired."
