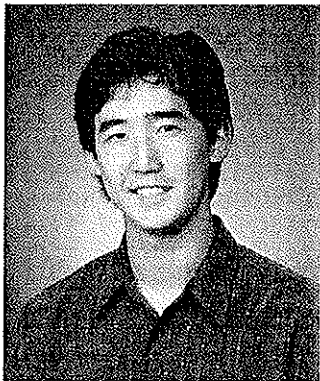
Ban will be attending the University of San Francisco and major in Hospitality.

Joleen will be attending Stanford University to study medicine.

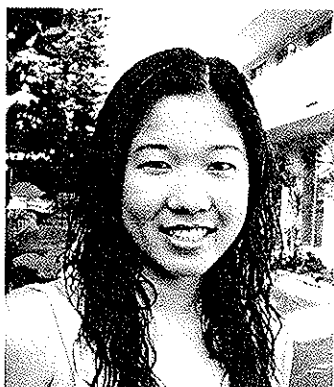


Kira Tamashiro is a graduate from Iolani School and is the daughter of Cyrus and Ann Tamashiro.

Kira will be attending Claremont McKenna College and major in Economics.

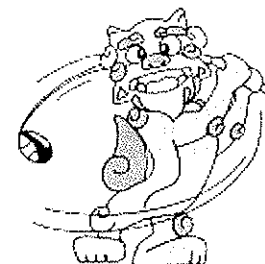


Lisa Tamashiro is a graduate of Kaimuki High School and is the daughter of Tetsushi and Kinuko Tamashiro.

Awamori returns to Hawaii with some new clothes

Fifteen years ago Randall Kuba's journey began. At the time he did not even drink much, but as he went back and forth between Hawaii and Okinawa, he developed a taste for Okinawa's signature distilled alcohol, *awamori*. His generous nature led him to bring it home and share with his friends this unique beverage that until recently could mostly be found only in Okinawa. As time passed, he decided to bring awamori to even more people.

So in September 2005, Randall received a shipment of awamori for his new company, Awamori Spirits LLC, to share with the state of Hawaii. This is not the first time that he has tried to do this. His first try was actually twelve years ago, but unattractive labels and bottles prevented it from being appreciated by a wider audience. Learning from the lessons of his previous attempt, Randall had new bottles and labels designed with an American audience in mind.

This time out Randall decided to really go for broke. He made sure his product was of the highest quality he could find. He spent the time to develop relationships with eleven of the 47 awamori distilleries in Okinawa. And it was not an easy task. Initially he was met with resistance as awamori was more than a business to the Okinawan distilleries. It was also a tradition and a way of life stretching back nearly five centuries. But he persevered and the fruits of his labor can now be enjoyed by all.

To introduce the drink to the average consumer, he created two lines of awamori, Dancing Sea and CraZcrane. Dancing Sea is a more sophisticated line with four flavors, Silver, Gold, Platinum, and Black. The percentage of alcohol increased from 25 percent to 43 percent and is aged from a minimum of 3 years to 10 years. CraZcrane is designed for the younger set and has three flavors, Silver Gold,

and Platinum. This line is aged from one to three years and ranges from 20 percent alcohol to 43 percent. Its high level of alcohol should not scare away light drinkers however, as its careful distillation process and high quality ingredients ensure that no strong aftereffects are felt the next morning.

Awamori is primarily made from Thai rice and koji, a type of black yeast native to Okinawa. It is normally stored in a kame, a type of ceramic pot. Awamori is a drink that is allowed to age for years. In parts of Okinawa are noted for their storage facilities devoted to Awamori, like Gyokusendo cave and Kin Kannonji, which has a cave that is 270 meters long and stores awamori for as long as 25 years or more.

This is awamori's chance to shine, as the wide variety being imported lets highlights its flexibility. Not only is it a great drink on its own, but it can be mixed with other alcoholic drinks and especially in cooking, either in the food or with it. Randall's dream to share the wonders of awamori extends not just to the state but to the mainland and beyond.

So if you enjoy awamori, pass the
